Former Blue Mountain Junior High School ESA/ABCA The Grant County Library Foundation (Foundation), a 501(c)3 non-profit organization is seeking to acquire the 2.1 acre former Blue Mountain Junior High School property at 116 NW Bridge Street, John Day, Oregon in Grant County. In 2009, the Foundation went through a process of identifying a location to site a new County Library - the current Library is too small, overcrowded and on a busy highway. The former Blue Mountain Junior High School property was selected because of its central location and ample parking. The Foundation is seeking funding assistance to complete an updated Phase One Environmental Site Assessment (ESA) and an Analysis of Brownfields Cleanup Alternatives (ABCA) as preparation for acquisition and cleanup of the site. The ABCA will evaluate various alternatives to remediate the contamination and select a preferred alternative most suitable for future use of the site as a library/community center site.	15,000

Funds provided to local Soil and Water Conservation Districts support implementation of Agricultural Water Quality Management Area Plans. This project includes providing outreach and technical assistance intended to improve landowner involvement in conservation activities that enhance water quality and salmon habitat.	174,354	
Monitoring Funds were provided to support monitoring efforts on the North Fork and Middle Fork John Day Rivers. These efforts include effectiveness monitoring of restoration projects, and stream temperature and groundwater monitoring in the Middle Fork John Day River Intensively Monitored Watershed project area.	78,900

<b>Restoration</b> Thirty-two grants provided funding for a variety of restoration projects that include grazing management improvements, removing noxious and invasive plants, creating irrigation efficiencies, developing off-stream watering sites, rehabilitating riparian and upland areas, improving instream habitat, and removing fish passage barriers. For example, the second phase of a long-term restoration project in the Oxbow Conservation Area will help restore the main channel of the Middle Fork John Day River and several of its tributaries that were severely damaged by past dredge mining. This restoration will significantly improve the instream habitat for both Chinook Salmon and steelhead.	1,356,924	
<b>Technical Assistance</b> A variety of grants provided technical engineering, design, or planning assistance for projects intended to assess riparian and upland restoration needs, or create information management systems. Projects include gathering data and assessing future invasive/noxious plant removal areas, evaluating the state of aspen stands in the Long Creek area, and developing alternatives for levee erosion along the North Fork John Day River.	156,203
